Authorised Corporate Director's ("ACD") Report

We are pleased to present the Annual Report & Audited Financial Statements for EF UCITS ICVC for the year ended 31 March 2026.

Authorised Status

EF UCITS ICVC ("the Company") is an investment company with variable capital ("ICVC") incorporated in England and Wales under registered number IC000380 and authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA"), with effect from 21 February 2005. The Company has an unlimited duration.

Shareholders are not liable for the debts of the Company.

Head Office: the Head Office of the Company is at Cedar House, 3 Cedar Park, Cobham Road, Wimborne, Dorset BH21 7SB.

The Head Office is the address of the place in the UK for service on the Company of notices or other documents required or authorised to be served on it.

Structure of the Company

The Company is structured as an umbrella company, in that different Funds may be established from time to time by the ACD with the approval of the FCA. On the introduction of any new Fund or Share Class, a revised prospectus will be prepared setting out the relevant details of each Fund or Share Class.

The Company is a UCITS scheme.

The assets of each Fund will be treated as separate from those of every other Fund and will be invested in accordance with the Investment Objective and Investment Policy applicable to that Fund. Investment of the assets of each of the Funds must comply with the FCA's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook ("COLL") and the Investment Objective and Policy of each of the relevant Funds.

Currently the Company has only one Fund, Verus Responsible Balanced Fund. In the future there may be other Funds established.

Under the UCITS Directive and the UCITS Remuneration Code, WAY Fund Managers ("WFM") as UCITS Manager, is required to establish and apply remuneration policies and practices for its staff that have a material impact on the risk profile of WAY Fund Managers Limited or the Company and disclose remuneration information (see page 36) on how those whose actions have a material impact on the Company are remunerated.

Important events during the Year

On 9 May 2025, Northern Trust Investor Services Limited resigned as the Fund's Depositary and was replaced by Apex Depositary (UK) Limited.

On 20 June 2025, the Synthetic Risk and Reward Indicator ("SRRI") of each of Verus Responsible Balanced Fund's Share classes were decreased from 5 to 4.

On 31 December 2025, V. Hoare resigned as a Director of WFM.

On 15 January 2026, J. Gregory appointed as a Director of WFM.

Important events after the Year End

LGT/Ethical Screening is resigned as Investment Manager of the Verus Responsible Balanced Fund with effect from 8 August 2025. Following this change, the Verus Responsible Balanced Fund will be merged into Castlefield. HLE has been agreed on the 10 June 2026, and the Fund termination process continuing in accordance with the approved arrangements.

Authorised Corporate Director's ("ACD") Report (continued)

Assessment of Value

The Financial Conduct Authority (FCA), the regulator for Financial Services, in its goal to provide transparency to investors, requires all Authorised Fund Managers (AFMs) to produce an Assessment of Value (AoV) for money offered by each share class in each fund or sub-fund under their management. Broadly speaking, an Assessment of Value requires the AFM to consider a combination of factors, including, but not limited to the quality of service provided to investors, the performance of the fund, the cost of investing in the fund, whether economies of scale can be achieved, comparable market rates and services and classes of units. WFM has chosen to publish the AoV separate to the Fund's annual report. This will be available within four months of the annual accounting end date of 31 March 2026, and can be found on WFM's website, at:

Going Concern Assessment

EF UCITS ICVC is in the process of termination, and as such the ACD's Directors are of the opinion that these Financial Statements be prepared on a basis other than that of a going concern.

The minimum Share Capital of the Company is £1 and the maximum is £100,000,000,000. Shares in the Company have no par value. The Share Capital of the Company at all times equals the Net Asset Value of the Fund.

We have audited the financial statements of EF UCITS ICVC ("the Company") and its sub-fund for the year ended 31 March 2026 which comprise the statement of total return, the statement of change in net assets attributable to shareholders, the balance sheet, notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and the distribution table. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), the Statement of Recommended Practice: "Financial Statements of UK Authorised Funds" issued by the Investment Association in May 2014 and amended in June 2017 (the Statement of Recommended Practice), the FCA's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook ("COLL"), and the Company's Instrument of Incorporation.

- We designed our audit procedures to ensure the audit team considered whether there were any indications of non-compliance by the Company with those laws and regulations. These procedures included:
 - o agreement of the financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation and agreeing that all relevant disclosures under the SORP and COLL were included.
 - o enquires of management and those charged with governance.
 - o reviewing correspondence with regulators.

• We assessed the susceptibility of the financial statements to material misstatement, including how fraud might occur, from discussions with senior management and obtaining an understanding of the controls and processes in place to prevent, deter and detect fraud. The key areas identified were revenue recognition and management override of the controls in place and our tests to address these included but were not limited to:

- o agreement of a sample of revenue receipts to third party evidence to check accuracy and occurrence.
- o agreement of a sample of realised gains and losses to third party evidence and bank statements to check accuracy and occurrence.
- o agreement of calculation of unrealised gains and losses and agreement of the valuation of year end investments to third party sources.
- o Identifying and testing journal entries made throughout the year which were considered to be large or unusual as well as a sample of others.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that we will not detect all irregularities, including those leading to a material misstatement in the financial statements or non-compliance with regulation. This risk increases the more that compliance with a law or regulation is removed from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, as we will be less likely to become aware of instances of non-compliance. The risk is also greater regarding irregularities occurring due to fraud rather than error, as fraud involves intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.

Verus Responsible Balanced Fund

Investment Manager's Report For the year ended 31 March 2026

Investment Objective

The objective of the Fund is to provide capital growth.

Investment Policy

The Fund aims to achieve its objective by investing a minimum of 75% of the invested portfolio (excluding cash held directly by the Fund) in assets that provide sustainable solutions to global social and environmental challenges. This will be made up of a combination of equity securities and collective investment schemes, and once the Fund reaches circa £25M in size, also corporate bond securities. A maximum of 75% of the Fund will be invested in equity assets, either directly or through collective investment schemes.

Meeting the "sustainable solutions" requirement is to be achieved by investing in companies that meet at least one of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, or collective funds that align to the UN SDGs¹. The collective investment schemes can be invested in fixed interest assets, alternatives and equities.

Up to 25% of the portfolio may be invested in stabilising assets including Government Bonds and Gold (via physically backed ETFs) which are assessed to be sustainable or at least 'neutral'. This is in order to increase diversification and reduce volatility during times of adverse market and/or economic conditions when, in the Investment Adviser's opinion, it would be in the best interests of the Fund and its shareholders to do so.

The Fund may also invest in deposits, money market instruments, cash and near cash. In the event of extremely adverse market conditions, the Fund could move to an increased position in cash in the best interests of the Fund and its shareholders.

All of the Fund's investable assets will undergo an independent ethical screening test, on a periodic basis, to ensure that none of the investable assets directly contravene the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

The portfolio will be actively managed and normally remain fully invested save for such operational liquidity as is required from time to time. There will, however, be no restrictions on the underlying content of the investments held, in terms of geographical area or economic sector, other than those imposed by the Regulations.

The Fund may make use of borrowing in line with the Regulations.

Upon giving 60 days' written notice to Shareholders, the Fund may use derivatives and/or hedging transactions permitted in connection with efficient portfolio management and/or for investment purposes. It is not intended that the use of derivatives in this way will change the risk profile of the Fund.

The assets of the Fund will be managed in such a way that the Shares in the Fund will be qualifying investments for Individual Savings Accounts.

Investment Review

The Verus Responsible Balanced Fund's objective is to deliver capital growth through investments that provide sustainable solutions to global social and environmental challenges. In line with its policy, at least 75% of the portfolio (excluding cash) is allocated to equity securities and Collective Investment Schemes aligned with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals ("UN SDGs"). Up to 25% may be invested in stabilising assets such as government bonds and gold to reduce volatility during adverse conditions. The portfolio remains actively managed without geographical or sector restrictions beyond regulatory requirements.

For the twelve months ending 31 March 2026, the Fund's B Inc Share Class delivered a return of +4.61%. Over the same period, the Fund's comparator benchmark, the Investment Association (IA) Mixed Investment 40–85% Shares sector average returned +11.05%, providing a broad indication of conditions for multi-asset strategies with similar equity exposure, though individual peer positioning will vary given the wide range of strategies within the peer group. Over the five-year period, the B Inc Share Class returned 12.66% while the comparator benchmark returned 26.96%.

Investment Manager's Report (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2026

Investment Review (Continued)

Equities were the main contributor to the Fund's returns. Global equity markets experienced significant volatility early in the period, driven by the announcement of United States ("U.S.") "Liberation Day" tariffs in April 2025, before rebounding strongly in second quarter 2025. Equities continued to trend higher for the rest of the reporting period, although in March 2026, this was partially reversed with the outbreak of war in the Middle East. Nonetheless, the MSCI ACWI index of global equities rose +17.7% (GBP total return) over the year to the end of March 2026, underscoring the strength of the asset class during the recovery phase. However, active managers generally struggled to generate outperformance against global indices, as the rally was concentrated in the largest U.S. technology stocks such as Nvidia (+57.2%) and Broadcom (+82.0%), and more generally in a narrow set of market themes such as the providers of AI hardware.

Most of the underlying equity managers delivered positive performance in the period, with returns in global equities driven by the two value-oriented holdings in Schroder Global Sustainable Value Equity (+18.91%) and Sparinvest SICAV Ethical Global Value (+18.82%). Active global equity managers with a quality bias struggled in comparison, with the holdings in Morgan Stanley Global Quality Select (-9.02%) and Lazard Global Sustainable Equity (-3.52%) exemplifying this. Underperformance of these strategies was attributable to a combination of lack of ownership of the areas driving the market like megacap technology, as well as negative selection effects within sectors like technology given the bias to sub-sectors like software and data analytics which underperformed during the period.

Thematic satellites generally delivered positive returns, with Ninety One Global Environment (+17.01%) and FP Foresight Global Real Infrastructure (+13.02%) benefiting from their exposure to areas like renewable energy in the context of issues of energy security coming to the fore in the context of geopolitical tensions.

Regional performance was mixed: the Polar Capital Emerging Market Stars (+24.42%) benefited from technology enthusiasm in Asia and emerging markets, while more defensive strategies such as Stewart Investors Asia Pacific Leaders (+8.38% until exit) lagged. Stewart's allocation to sectors like consumer staples, which saw muted returns compared with technology-led areas, contributed to its relative underperformance. In North America, SVS Alliance Bernstein Sustainable US Equity (+3.88%) and Mirova US Sustainable Equity (-0.71%) underperformed their index comparators in the context of the aforementioned challenges facing quality active managers.

Alternatives added modest gains, with the Trojan Ethical (+5.57%) supported by its allocation to gold. Fixed income delivered positive returns overall, led by corporate bond strategies such as Rathbone Ethical Bond (+4.67%) and Threadneedle UK Social Bond (+3.38%). Government bonds underperformed corporate bonds, particularly long-duration gilts, as reflected in the Vanguard U.K. Long Duration Gilt Index (-3.12% until sale), amid persistent fiscal and inflationary pressures.

Portfolio activity during the period focused on enhancing diversification and simplifying structure. The holding in SVS Alliance Bernstein Sustainable US Thematic Equity was halved, and the Liontrust Sustainable Future Global Growth was exited, with proceeds reinvested into Mirova US Sustainable Equity to increase exposure to large-cap U.S. equities with resilient earnings. Additionally, the Stewart Investors Worldwide All Cap Equity was reallocated across core global strategies following a review of its recent performance. In Europe a position in EdenTree Sustainable European Equity was added in light of our positive view of the manager's investment process as well as a desire to introduce more balance to the regional equity allocation considering the Fund's value bias, and this was funded through the exit of lower conviction Liontrust Sustainable Future Global Growth. Within fixed income, the position in the Vanguard U.K. Long Duration Gilt Index was sold, taking advantage of the rally at the very long end of the yield curve at the beginning of 2026 and repositioning the Fund closer to the 10-year area of the curve where we saw better value.

Investment Review (Continued)

Looking ahead, the strategy remains centred on disciplined asset selection and diversification to mitigate concentration risk in global equity indices. The portfolio will maintain a balance between core holdings and satellite allocations aimed at generating strong absolute returns over the medium term. Equity exposure continues to be overweight, with a growing emphasis on regions outside the U.S. Within equities, the focus is on quality holdings and selective exposure to Asia and Emerging Market. In fixed income, the emphasis remains on high credit quality and short dated parts of the asset class. Monetary policy developments are being closely monitored, particularly in light of recent inflationary shocks.

The first quarter has shown how quickly conditions can change. The conflict in the Middle East has pushed energy prices higher and reminded markets how dependent the global economy still is on exports from politically fragile regions. For many countries, especially energy importers like the United Kingdom ("U.K.") and Eurozone, this raises the risk of higher inflation at the same time as growth is slowing and has led to renewed volatility in both bond and equity markets. In this more uncertain environment, the strategy remains tilted towards high-quality, resilient businesses and issuers with sustainable cash flows, strong balance sheets and clear roles in the real economy, complemented by selective fixed income and alternatives exposure. We believe this emphasis on quality and sustainability, combined with diversification across different drivers of return, remains a sensible way to navigate a world where geopolitics, energy and technology are increasingly intertwined

1 Accounting Basis And Policies

(a) Basis of accounting

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of investments and in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standards Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") for Financial Statements of UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014, Open-Ended Investment Companies Regulations 2001 ("the OEIC Regulations"), the FCA's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook ("COLL") and the Company's Instrument of Incorporation.

As described in the Certification of Financial Statements by Directors of the ACD on page 5, the ACD has commenced the process of terminating the sub-fund following which the Company will be wound-up. Accordingly the ACD does not consider the Company to be a going concern and has prepared the Financial Statements on a basis other than that of a going concern. There were no material effects as a result of the Financial Statements being prepared on a basis other than going concern.

(b) Realised and unrealised gains and losses

Realised gains or losses have been calculated as the proceeds from disposal less book cost.

Unrealised gain/losses are calculated with reference to the original recorded value of the asset or liability, and only the element of gain/loss within the accounting period is recorded in the Financial Statements. All unrealised and realised gains are capital in nature and do not form part of the Fund's distributable income.

Central Securities Depositories Regulation (CSDR) entered into force in 2014 with an objective of improving securities settlements in the European Union. One of the cornerstones of the CSDR is the introduction of an obligation on central securities depositories (CSDs) to impose cash penalties on participants to their securities settlement systems that cause settlement failures. The cash penalties may be accounted for as an expense or income (if the 3rd party was responsible for the failure of trade settlement). The CSDR penalties will be reimbursed by the Investment Manager as necessary to ensure that the Funds will not suffer undue costs.

(c) Recognition of revenue

Dividends on quoted equities and preference Shares are recognised when the securities are quoted ex-dividend and are recognised net of attributable tax credits.

Revenue from debt securities is accounted for on a straight line amortization basis. Accrued interest on purchase and sale contracts is recognised as revenue and transferred to revenue or capital as appropriate.

Distributions from Collective Investment Schemes are recognised when the schemes are quoted ex-distribution. Equalisation returned with the distribution is deducted from the cost of the investment and does not form part of the distributable revenue.

Interest on bank and other cash deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.

All revenue includes withholding taxes but excludes irrecoverable tax credits.

(d) Treatment of stock and special dividends

The ordinary element of stock dividends received in lieu of cash dividends is credited to capital in the first instance followed by a transfer to revenue of the cash equivalent being offered and this forms part of the distributable revenue.

Special dividends are reviewed on a case by case basis in determining whether the dividend is to be treated as revenue or capital. Amounts recognised as revenue will form part of the distributable revenue. The tax treatment follows the treatment of the principal amount.

Accounting Policies and Financial Instruments (continued)

For the year ended 31 March 2026

1 Accounting Basis And Policies (continued)

(e) Treatment of expenses

Expenses of the Fund are charged against revenue except for costs associated with the purchase and sale of investments which are allocated to the capital of the Fund.

Expenses are recorded on an accrual basis but the Fund may incur additional allowable expenses which are charged as and when they are incurred.

(f) Allocation of revenue and expenses to multiple Share Classes

Any revenue or expenses not directly attributable to a particular Share Class will normally be allocated pro-rata to the net assets of the relevant Share Classes.

(g) Taxation

Tax is provided for using tax rates and laws which have been enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

Corporation tax is provided for on the income liable to corporation tax less deductible expenses.

Where tax has been deducted from revenue that tax can, in some instances, be set off against the corporation tax payable, by way of double tax relief.

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on all timing differences arising on the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes, calculated at the rate at which it is anticipated the timing differences will reverse. Deferred tax assets are recognised only when, on the basis of available evidence, it is probable that there will be taxable profits in the future against which the deferred tax asset can be offset.

(h) Distribution policy

The net revenue after taxation, as disclosed in the Financial Statements, after adjustment for items of a capital nature, is distributable to Shareholders as dividend distributions. Any revenue deficit is deducted from capital.

In addition, the portfolio transaction charges will be charged wholly to the capital of the Fund. Accordingly, the imposition of such charges may constrain the capital growth of the Fund.

The ACD has elected to pay all revenue less expenses charged to revenue and taxation as a bi-annual distribution at the end of the annual accounting period.

(i) Basis of valuation of investments

Market value is defined by the SORP as fair value which is the bid value of each security.

Collective investment schemes are valued at quoted bid prices for dual priced funds and at quoted prices for single priced funds, on the last business day of the accounting year.

All securities with quoted prices in active markets, including open ended funds and all investment trusts are classified as Level 1 in the Fair Value Disclosure described in the Notes to the Financial Statements.

All investments are recognised and derecognised on trade date, and any trades that occur between valuation point and close of business are included in the Financial Statements.

Non-observable entity specific data is only used where relevant observable market data is not available. Typically this category will include single broker-priced instruments, suspended/unquoted securities, private equity, unlisted close-ended funds and open-ended funds with restrictions on redemption rights.

Accounting Policies and Financial Instruments (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2026

1 Accounting Basis And Policies (continued)

(j) Exchange rates

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded in Pound Sterling at the rate ruling at the date of the transactions. Assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies at the end of the accounting year are translated into Pound Sterling at the closing mid market exchange rates ruling on that date.

(k) Dilution Adjustment

The ACD may require a dilution adjustment on the sale and redemption of Shares if, in its opinion, the existing Shareholders (for sales) or remaining Shareholders (for redemptions) might otherwise be adversely affected. In particular, the dilution adjustment may be charged in the following circumstances: where the scheme property is in continual decline; on a Fund experiencing large levels of net sales relative to its size; on 'large deals'; in any case where the ACD is of the opinion that the interests of remaining Shareholders require the imposition of a dilution adjustment.

(l) Equalisation

Equalisation applies only to Shares purchased during the distribution period (Group 2 Shares). It represents the accrued revenue included in the purchase price of the Shares.

After averaging it is returned with the distribution as a capital repayment. It is not liable to income tax but must be deducted from the cost of the Shares for Capital Gains tax purposes.

(m) Derivatives

The Fund may enter into permitted transactions such as derivative contracts or forward foreign currency transactions. Where these transactions are used to protect or enhance revenue, the revenue and expenses are included within net revenue in the Statement of Total Return.

Where the transactions are used to protect or enhance capital, the gains/losses are treated as capital and included within gains/losses on investments in the Statement of Total Return. Any open positions in these types of transactions at the year end are included in the Balance Sheet at their mark to market value. There were no derivative transactions during the year.

2 Derivatives and other financial instruments

Management of risk is a critical responsibility of the ACD in managing the Company.

The Fund for which WAY Fund Managers Limited acts as ACD are exposed to a wide range of risks. The purpose of the ACD's Risk Management Policy ("RMP") is to identify these risks and document the controls and processes in place to manage and mitigate these risks. The specific risks to the Funds are documented in sections (a) to (i) below and are reviewed on a regular basis.

In pursuing the investment objectives a number of financial instruments are held which may comprise securities and other investments, cash balances and debtors and creditors that arise directly from operations. Derivatives, such as futures or forward currency contracts, may be utilised for hedging

The main risks from the Company's holding of financial instruments, together with the ACD's policy for managing these risks, are disclosed below:

Accounting Policies and Financial Instruments (continued) **For the year ended 31 March 2026**

2 Derivatives and other financial instruments (continued)

(a) Foreign currency risk

A significant portion of the Company's assets or the underlying assets of the collective investment schemes and equities in which the Company invests may be denominated in a currency other than the base currency of the Company or Class. There is the risk that the value of such assets and/or the value of any distributions from such assets may decrease if the underlying currency in which assets are traded falls relative to the base currency in which Shares of the relevant Fund are valued and priced.

The Company is not required to hedge its foreign currency risk, although it may do so through foreign currency exchange contracts, forward contracts, currency options and other methods. To the extent that the Company does not hedge its foreign currency risk or such hedging is incomplete or unsuccessful, the value of the Company's assets and revenue could be adversely affected by currency exchange rate movements. There may also be circumstances in which a hedging transaction may reduce currency gains that would otherwise arise in the valuation of the Company in circumstances where no such hedging transactions are undertaken.

(b) Interest rate risk profile of financial assets and liabilities

The interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the Company's investments will fluctuate due to changes in the interest rate. Cashflows from floating rate securities, bank balances, or bank overdrafts will be affected by the changes in interest rates. As the Company's objective is to seek capital growth, these cashflows are considered to be of secondary importance and are not actively managed.

The Company did not have any long term financial liabilities at the balance sheet date.

(c) Credit risk

The Company may find that companies in which it invests fail to settle their debts on a timely basis. The value of securities issued by such companies may fall as a result of the perceived increase in credit risk. Adhering to investment guidelines and avoiding excessive exposure to one particular issuer can limit credit risk.

(d) Liquidity risk

Subject to the Regulations, the Company may invest up to and including 20% of the Scheme Property of the Company in transferable securities which are not approved securities (essentially transferable securities which are admitted to official listing in an EEA state or traded on or under the rules of an eligible securities market). Such securities and instruments are generally not publicly traded, may be unregistered for securities law purposes and may only be able to be resold in privately negotiated transactions with a limited number of purchasers. The difficulties and delays associated with such transactions could result in the Company's inability to realise a favourable price upon disposal of such securities, and at times might make disposition of such securities and instruments impossible. To the extent the Company invests in securities and instruments the terms of which are privately negotiated, the terms of such securities and instruments may contain restrictions regarding resale and transfer.

2 Derivatives and other financial instruments (continued)

(d) Liquidity risk (continued)

In addition, certain listed securities and instruments, particularly securities and instruments of smaller capitalised or less seasoned issuers, may from time to time lack an active secondary market and may be subject to more abrupt or erratic price movements than securities of larger, more established companies or stock market averages in general. In the absence of an active secondary market the Company's ability to purchase or sell such securities at a fair price may be impaired or delayed.

(e) Market price risk

The Company invests principally in collective investment schemes and equities. The value of these investments are not fixed and may go down as well as up. This may be the result of a specific factor affecting the value of an individual equity or be caused by general market factors (such as government policy or the health of the underlying economy) which can affect the entire portfolio. The Investment Manager seeks to minimise these risks by holding a diversified portfolio in line with the Company's objectives. In addition, the management of the Company complies with the FCA's COLL sourcebook, which includes rules prohibiting a holding greater than 35% of assets in any one Fund.

(f) Counterparty risk

Transactions in securities entered into by the Company give rise to exposure to the risk that the counterparties may not be able to fulfil their responsibility by completing their side of the transaction. The Investment Manager minimises this risk by conducting trades through only the most reputable counterparties.

Counterparty risk is also managed by limiting the exposure to individual counterparties through adherence to the investment spread restrictions included within the Company's prospectus and COLL.

(g) Operational risk

Operational risk is the risk of loss arising from systems failure, human error, fraud or external events. When controls fail to perform, operational risks can cause damage to reputation, have legal or regulatory implications, or lead to financial loss. The Company cannot eliminate operational risks but, through the continual review and assessment of its control environment, by monitoring and responding to potential risks, they can be managed.

High level controls include effective segregation of duties, trade confirmation checking and reconciliation procedures, incident reporting and oversight of delegated functions.

(h) Leverage

In accordance with the SORP issued in May 2014, as ACD we are required to disclose any leverage of the Fund. Leverage is defined as any method by which the Fund increases its exposure through borrowing or the use of derivatives (calculated as the sum of the net asset value and the incremental exposure through the derivatives and in accordance with the SORP commitment approach (CESR/10-788)) divided by the net asset value.

The Fund's exposure is defined with reference to the 'Commitment' method. Commitment method exposure is calculated as the sum of all positions of the Fund, after netting off derivative and security positions and is disclosed within the Financial Statements Note 14(d).

(i) Fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities

There is no material difference between the value of the financial assets and liabilities, as shown in the balance sheet, and their fair value.
